"The mission of the Sawtooth & Interpretive Historical Association is to protect and advance the natural and cultural history of Idaho's Sawtooth-Salmon River Country through preservation and education," which reflects our current activity level. We no sooner finish one project -

then we're on to the next! In June we relaunch the **Sawtooth Forum and Lecture Series**, so please mark your calendars for these Friday afternoon events. (Super activity to share with visiting friends and family.)

The Stanley Museum, open daily from 11:00 am to 5:00 pm, continues to be a great place to visit and spark or rekindle interest in the history of this challenging, magnificent country. Bring a picnic lunch and enjoy the scenery from the outdoor tables. Check out the new Historic Walking Tour of Stanley brochure (enclosed). The Museum is also undertaking (see following) an extensive restoration of the Ice House so please brush up on your skills as a Sidewalk Superintendant! Intern Lin Gray, AmeriCorps member from the McCall Outdoor School, will be working with us on several projects this summer. And local volunteers will be cataloging artifacts, greeting visitors, engaging in minor construction projects. Have a little time to spare? We encourage you to stop in and visit with Diane Willis, Museum Attendant and Volunteer Coordinator. And while you're there, don't forget to browse our ever changing natural and cultural history books, maps and posters. We try to add new items every year.

Oral Histories

Have you ever wondered, "Who were those people who settled in Stanley sixty years ago? Who would dare to leave the comforts of their home to live in the remote town of Stanley and start a business there? How did they do it? Why did they do it?" This summer you will be able to "meet" some of those brave individuals through our collection of interviews at the Stanley Museum. Stop by the Museum, relax and watch a video and learn about the wild and crazy early days in the Valley. Hear firsthand about the Salmon River lined with fish, the feisty characters who challenged the town's first sheriff, Saturday nights at the old Ace of Diamonds dance hall, the hippie invasion in the late 1960's, and the challenges and accomplishments of the first Forest Service employees. Once you've become acquainted with these unique pioneers, head back into town and take the walking tour to see some of the places where they lived and worked...and it will become clear how Stanley has become a place with a touch of magic!

Ice House Restoration

SIHA began an program last summer to restore, as an historical exhibit, the Ice House adjacent to the Stanley Museum.

To date, fundraising efforts have generated over \$13,000 from more than 75 SIHA Members and friends with donations still coming in. We have also received grants of \$6,000 from Idaho Heritage Trust and \$5,000 from the Sawtooth Society to help with this project. However, since the project

involves greater than projected environmental compliance costs, fundraising efforts must continue.

After meeting with two qualified historic restoration experts and the Forest Service to develop a construction plan which meets environmental standards, it appears the rehabilition work should begin in 2009.

SIHA plans to continue to work on the Ice House as funding allows, and use volunteer help wherever possible. Once the restoration is complete, the building will be opened to the public. An important ongoing exhibit will be blocks of "ice" on display. These blocks, along with a plaque, will contain the names of donors who contributed to this project. We hope you will visit the Museum complex this summer to observe

Historic Walking Tour of Stanley Available

On June 24, you can take the **Historic Walking Tour of Stanley** with a guide knowledgeable about the colorful history of this quirky community nestled in the Sawtooth National Recreation Area. After June 24, you can take this tour, self-guided, using the enclosed brochure. The tour brings to life some of the area's earlier citizens, as well as the rich history of trapping, mining, grazing, and outdoor recreation and tourism.

One of the "hats" SIHA wears is the Historic Preservation Commission for the City of Stanley. When the City was awarded a grant by the Idaho Humanities Council to develop a self-guiding walking tour of historic sites and structures, the City asked SIHA to develop the tour. Last summer, SIHA's interns solicited community help to determine which sites and structures (existing and previous) of special significance should be included in the tour. The enclosed brochure is keyed to signed

sites and buildings throughout Stanley.

These are highly recommended publications for both beginning and advanced nature lovers. For kids, we are offering the book, Salmon Stream, which depicts the life cycle of salmon in easy to understand words and pictures. It also provides a more in depth section for parents or teachers. Kids will love Nature's Yucky! This book tells of 'gross' behaviors some animals have and explains why they do what they do. We also have new coloring books this year.

Retired Forest Ranger Dan Pence has written *Horses, Mules, Men & Mountains* about his time in the Lost River, Salmon and Challis areas. This along with the continuing offering of *Stanley Sawtooth Country, Southern Idaho Ghost Towns, Traplines* and many other historical publications give people an appreciation for the history of the Salmon River country.
