An amazing opportunity has presented itself right in the middle of the Sawtooth Valley!

The Sawtooth Interpretive & Historical Association (SIHA) is working to secure a generous gift of the "Sessions" property on Highway 75 in Obsidian, Idaho, in the middle of the SNRA, from Smiley Creek Bears, LLC (Jones Family). SIHA is excited to augment its mission of protecting and advancing the Sawtooth and Salmon River country through education and preservation, by providing planning, set-up, and initial organization of this project. Funds are needed for immediate design, master planning, real estate closing costs, initial operations, as well as maintenance.

Our vision is to create a conservation and education center that benefits the regional community and general public. It will be a home for area nonprofits, educational resources, conservation outreach, workforce housing, and accessible year-round presence for the Dark Sky Reserve and other entities. We have been consulting with the owners, public project development experts, building inspectors, SNRA staff, and stakeholders. Time constraints require that we have an initial plan and seed funding in place prior to completing the property donation.

This is a chance to build a long-term, sustainable legacy in a place we all love and appreciate. If we work together to make this happen, we can build a stronger presence of education, awareness, and conservation in the Sawtooth country for generations to come!

BENEFITS OF PROPERTY DONATION

- Public education is expanded and enhanced to emphasize the scenic, natural, historic, pastoral, fish, and wildlife values described in the legislation establishing the SNRA.
- SIHA (and potentially other nonprofits) have opportunity for year-round presence, improved exposure, staff housing, and better mission fulfillment.
- Reduces housing requests to SNRA; increases support/partnership between entities.
- Sawtooth/Stanley community receives additional onsite housing, community support, interpretation/environmental/conservation outreach through nonprofits.
- Present owner receives donation tax benefit and a valley legacy.

POTENTIAL USES

- A shared home for Area Nonprofits:
 - Nonprofit office space, potential bookstore and outreach/education center.
 - o Opportunities for greater collaboration among nonprofit organizations.
 - Seasonal Housing for SIHA naturalists, museum staff, and/or trail crews.
 - o Opportunities for additional community and nonprofit partners over time.
- A nature center, open to the general public, providing a central location for education efforts and small gatherings.
- Dark Sky Reserve: Potential year-round access for office, information center.
- Seasonal/Year-round housing for area workers could provide an income stream for maintenance of the property and help fill the need for affordable community housing.
- Potential location for electric vehicle charging station.

ORGANIZATIONAL STRUCTURE

- The vision is for SIHA to be a pass-through entity to accept the donation of property (due to time constraints), then seek sustainable funding and management through the formation of a new nonprofit or trust to manage development and use of the property.
- The new entity would be overseen by a diverse Board of Trustees.
- Development/operation of property would include executing agreements with potential site users.
- All USFS, state, county, Dark Sky, safety, environmental, and other regulations will be adhered to.
- Funding to be through donations, rentals, sales, programs, grants, and other avenues.
